When Adar Arrives. Get Happier!

As I'm composing this message for our March bulletin, we have already entered and begun the Hebrew month of Adar. There is a famous rabbinic expression that says "Nichnas Adar, Marbim B'Simcha," which translated means "When Adar Begins, We Increase in our Happiness." Why is this so? Because during the month of Adar, we celebrate the festival of

Purim and commemorate both our survival and our freedom!

In point of fact, it seems that many of the exact historical details of the Purim story are somewhat sketchy; although the story is set in Persia, we don't seem to know exactly all of the details of many aspects, except as correlated and reported in the book of Esther. One thing remains clear, however: even if plans of the persecution set in place by the wicked vizier at the time, Haman, did not exactly occur as related in the story, nonetheless, throughout Jewish history there were indeed many persecutions and pogroms, and so the tale of survival and triumph of one community in particular is felt and celebrated by all Jewish communities.

The central motif of the story as it unfolds is that things are not as they may seem, and that key reversals take place as things unfold. Indeed, what appears as absolute certainty and foreboding evil during the first half of the story gets totally reversed by the end. In that sense, the real underlying sequence and truth of events remains "hidden." This is why the wearing of costumes and masks is so appropriate and fitting, as these are designed to hide the true identities of the various characters involved. Specifically in the story of Esther, the wicked Haman has great power and plans to destroy and annihilate all of the Jews; in the end, he and his ten sons meet their demise. Mordechai, who is lowly and despised at the beginning, dressing in sackcloth and ashes, in the end becomes the brave and honored hero. Esther, who at the beginning is just a rather timid and unassuming "nice Jewish girl," by the end is elevated to the status of queen, wielding great power of persuasion upon the monarch while very deftly maneuvering within the constraints of the byzantine politics and social structure of the time. Even the eunuchs, normally always in the background protecting just the women of the harem, "step up to the plate" and play a decisive role in remembering and acknowledging how important the role of Mordechai was in reporting and obstructing a plot to kill the king. In the end, while it was Haman's plot to destroy and kill all of the Jews, in the end they are allowed to defend themselves, and Haman gets the "short end of the rope" as he is hung on the very gallows that he had created in order to hang Mordechai!!

While every culture needs certain holidays to relax and balance out the more serious ones, certainly the story of Esther and the festival of Purim communicate very important themes to us: Our faith in God and in our ability to survive and thrive even in the presence of evil targeted to destroy us (even though notably the actual name of God is not specifically mentioned once in the story itself); and also most centrally, our important ability to discern and realize those truths and elements that are ultimately important, despite common and popular indications to the contrary.

In our own community here at Temple Torat Yisrael in East Greenwich, we will be celebrating and commemorating the festival by reading portions of the megillah telling the story of Esther, as Jewish communities have done already for centuries now, as well as celebrating the occasion with a festive meal (a S'eudat Purim) and other elements of entertainment. This will take place on Monday evening, March 6, beginning at 6:00 p.m. Be sure to come in costume, and we will enjoy a great Purim/Israeli style meal prepared by Elaine Shapiro and crew featuring chicken shawarma meatballs, pasta, hummus, tabbouleh, and great drinks and desserts, along with a shortened reading of the Megillah! This is for our temple members only and is free of charge, but we do need your reservation by March 1. RSVP to Temple@toratyisrael.org

Torat Yisrael's Cohen School

February at The Cohen School was filled with classroom exploration, Hebrew, parshah of the week lessons and the focus on the holiday Tu B'shevat. Some classes created wonderful tree crafts and read books about trees while others enjoyed sampling the seven species of Israel: wheat, barley, grapes, figs, pomegranates, olives, and dates.

The students have also been busy preparing for our Purim Megillah celebration coming up in March. In addition to exploring the story, characters and traditions of the holiday, the classes are either making groggers, paper Megillahs and/or Mishloach Manot. On March 5th, students will be baking hamantaschen, participating in an in-school Purim Megillah program and can enjoy the parent run Purim Carnival after school at noon. Each week all of the classes meet in the main sanctuary to practice the prayers that they are learning in their classrooms. The students continue to work hard to learn the tunes, Hebrew and the choreography of the service. Every student, whether in kindergarten through seventh grade, each week, has the opportunity to lead a prayer from the bimah. In fact, sometimes, we have too many volunteers! It really has been such a wonderful learning experience and we hope that the students are learning to be comfortable in a sanctuary.

The second session of Bootcamp is off to a great and energetic start. This program runs for 10 weeks, on Mondays 4:30-5:30 for \$100. Please see Dori if you are interested in signing your child up. We are in week five but it's not too late to join the fun. We play Hebrew games, sing songs, practice Aleph Champ skills and even play Hebrew number musical

The Night Travelers: A Novel by Armando Lucas Correa

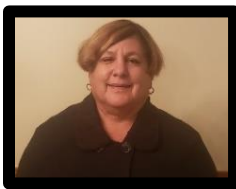
Berlin, 1931: Ally Keller, a talented young poet, is alone and scared when she gives birth to a mixed-race daughter, she names Lilith. As the Nazis rise to power, Ally knows she must keep her baby in the shadows to protect her against Hitler's deadly ideology of Aryan purity. But as she grows, it becomes more and more difficult to keep Lilith hidden so Ally sets in motion a dangerous and desperate plan to send her daughter across the ocean to safety.

Havana, 1958: Now an adult, Lilith has few memories of her mother or her childhood in Germany. Besides, she's too excited for her future with her beloved Martin, a Cuban pilot with strong ties to the Batista government. But as the flames of revolution ignite, Lilith and her newborn daughter, Nadine, find themselves at a terrifying crossroads.

Berlin, 1988: As a scientist in Berlin, Nadine is dedicated to ensuring the dignity of the remains of all those who were murdered by the Nazis. Yet she has spent her entire lifetime avoiding the truth about her own family's history. It takes her daughter, Luna, to encourage Nadine to uncover the truth about the choices her mother and grandmother made to ensure the survival of their children. And it will fall to Luna to come to terms with a shocking betrayal that changes everything she thought she knew about her family's past.

Separated by time but united by sacrifice, four women embark on journeys of self-discovery and find themselves to be living testaments to the power of motherly love.
